HEP has initiated the process of creating new High School Equivalency noncredit curriculum. HEP Director and one HEP Instructor met with Kelly Locke, Curriculum Committee Chair, Ana Gonzales, Director of Continuing Education who oversees noncredit offerings, and Jaimee DePompeo, ESL adjunct faculty to discuss the proposed format of these courses. Ms. Locke explained the process moving forward. The group also received answers regarding the new curriculum and how it can best benefit Spanish speaking students. The tentative date of approval for this curriculum is the Fall of 2020 for implementation/scheduling on the Fall of 2021.

The SSS/TRIO Director continues to assist SSS/TRIO students with California State University/University of California applications and Educational Opportunity Program applications. Becoming a member of the CSU EOP will provide transferring students with the following services: EOP advising, EOP peer mentors, EOP Summer Bridge and if there is funding for EOP transfer students, the EOP grant. These services will

assist our Hartnell College students who transfer to survive their transition at a CSU.

The SSS/TRIO Director continues to assist SSS/TRIO students to complete Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer scholarship applications. Hartnell College SSS/TRIO Program has had three JKC Transfer Scholarship (\$120,000) winners.
